There's a pretty good place to eat, drink and chill right next to the venue. It is an open air market / food truck kind of environment with lots of different vendors.

My Experience Crossing into Tijuana by Car:

I have driven across many times. The advantage of driving is that you save money on parking near the border, as well as cab / uber rides, etc.. The disadvantage is, there is a longer line to get back to the US.

If you drive your own car across, I suggest Mexico insurance. You purchase it online and take a copy of the policy with you. You can look up your insurance carrier and get your added coverage online for about \$45 or so.

You can get stopped for inspection on the way in, but they usually let most cars through.

Passport / REALID: If you have a passport or REALID, that is all you need to go to Tijuana, and back. If not, make sure you have your Drivers License with you, and perhaps a copy of your birth certificate. The US authorities know how to look you up by your Drivers License alone in any case.

My Experience Crossing into Mexico by **Walking Across**:

I've walked across into Tijuana several times. It is pretty easy to walk across, and then walk back across the border later in the evening. The disadvantage is, you have to pay for parking on the US side, which can be expensive, and then walk to the border and across.

Parking: Pay lots of attention to the prices. The closer you are to the border, the more they cost.

One alternative is:

Beyer Blvd Trolley Station - the trolley one-stop to San Ysidro. It's a five minute ride or less.

Address: 4035 Beyer Boulevard, San Diego, California

From getting on the trolley to jumping into a cab in Mexico took 15 minutes.

The only negative is that there is not much parking in their lot, but there is some in the surrounding neighborhood.

Passport: The Mexican authorities do ask to see your passport or REALID. You can talk your way across if you don't have one. Getting back to the US is actually easier, since they can look up your Drivers License information on their systems.

I like Uber better than a cab. If you use a cab, ask up front how much into Tijuana to your hotel. They are hungry and will negotiate.

Safety:

I haven't had any trouble. We stay in the tourist areas, mostly in Zona Rio, except for the Big Punch venue, which is a busy and well traveled area as well.

There is also safety in numbers. Hit me if you'd like to go, and you don't want to drive alone. I will get you in touch with some of the other Outlaws going. More fun to hang with your friends in any case.
